## ASK THE ORACLE

Hello. I'm the Oracle and invite residents to ask questions on what to do and who to contact when assistance is needed on local matters.

#### How do I report faults in street lighting on my road?

The first thing you will need to do, is find out who the lighting column belongs to. All lighting columns have an identifying number on them and all Broadland District Council lights have an identifying sticker on them. All other lighting columns will belong to Norfolk County Council. Hellesdon Parish Council do not own or have responsibility for street lighting.

For Broadland Street Lights you need to call 01603 430534 or you can email environ.protection@broadland.gov.uk or use the Broadland District Council website via www.broadland.gov.uk/transport\_and\_streets and use the online reporting form.

For Norfolk County Council street lights you need to call 0344 800 8008 or use the Nofolk County Council website www.norfolkstreelighting.amey.co.uk and use the online reporting form

#### Information you need to report a fault?

You will need to provide the following details to report any streetlight fault: Column number, or location on street (e.g. a house number/ junction with another road etc.

Street name and in the Parish of Hellesdon.

#### PLAYING FIELDS, AMENITIES & Allotments committee

The main concern this year has been bringing our new allotments into operation. The newly acquired land has enabled the Council to more than double total allotment provision. Take up of the new allotments – which are only available to residents of Hellesdon- has been very strong, and we are rapidly reaching the point where they will all be occupied, so if you

would like one get your request in quickly! It is all too likely we will return to having a waiting list during next year. Over the winter period work will be undertaken to plant new hedging which in due course will hopefully offset the inevitably harsh visual impact of the fencing necessary to the new allotments and neighbouring recreation space.

Preparation requirements for the recreational space are in hand and work should be commencing shortly with a view to opening during the coming year.

The planned transfer of Mountfield Park from Broadland District Council to Hellesdon Parish Council should be taking place shortly. It is pleasing that the park is well used and appreciated. Whilst many residents have expressed strong feelings that they like the park as it is the Council is open to suggestions for improvements where these can be accommodated without detriment to the present natural feeling of the area or neighbours.

An area of continuing challenge to the committee is the pressure on space at the Community Centre recreation ground. The committee wishes to press on with replacing the vandalised play equipment in the senior play area but the possibility of needing to tackle problems of drainage of the adjacent car park by soakaways under the play area has delayed progress. It is hoped this will be resolved shortly so that we can return again to having the standards of play equipment we would wish. In the meantime it is pleasing that the skateboard / basket ball area opened last year continues to be popular as does our conservation area although this is not the time of the year to see it at its' best!


Each year Broadland District Council presents an Enhancement Award and every other year a Green Award for properties and developments that stand out as lead examples in the district.


internet, and share a link to it on www.showmetheaccess.co.uk a new website that Molly has been working on for the last year or so.

### OPENING & CLOSING OF RECREATION GROUND, MOUNTFIELD PARK & MEADOW WAY

s we are now leaving November behind residents are reminded that the **Recreation Ground and Mountfield Park close at 4pm, with Meadow Way closing this year from 3.45pm.** This closing is in line with the Winter schedule which applies from 1 November until 28 February. While most residents are appreciative of this, there have been occasions where Parish Council staff have been subject to abuse while undertaking unlocking and locking duties.

Whilst during the winter schedule Mountfield Park and Meadow Way is open and closed by the Grounds staff Monday to Friday, at weekends these duties are undertaken by Caretaking staff. The opening times of the areas adhere to staff employment times and have to be considered within other required duties

The Recreation Ground - to remind and clarify:

The gates at the Recreation Ground are opened by the Caretakers who are employed Monday to Saturday from 7.30am and Sundays from 8am. Upon entering the site the duty, providing there are no apparent unusual circumstances, is to open the vehicular access on Woodview Road. The remaining site gates are opened after the requirement to enter Hellesdon Community Centre to ensure there are no immediate issues to be dealt with.

On Sundays in order to accommodate requirements, the opening of the Community Centre takes precedence of opening Wood View Road and the remaining site gates. Any unusual circumstances could result in action being taken that would delay or prevent unlocking of the site and this would be the case until any such circumstance is resolved.

With the number of external gates needing to be opened, it takes 20 – 30 minutes to complete unlocking therefore providing there are no unusual circumstances, the parks should be fully opened by approximately 8am and 8.30am respectively. Thank you for your co-operation.

## HELLESDON PARISH COUNCIL MANAGEMENT OF OUTDOOR SURFACES IN SEVERE WEATHER CONDITIONS



nder the terms of the Occupiers' Liability Acts 1957 and 1984 the Parish Council is responsible for taking all reasonably practicable measures to ensure the safety of all visitors to its premises and land. This includes the need for suitable precautions during severe weather conditions.

The areas covered by this policy are hard surface car parks and hard surface footways to the main entrances of buildings, and the policy has been developed following a review of the existing risk assessment.

In order to comply with the legal requirement in a practical manner, the Parish Council's policy with regard to the management of surfaces which may become hazardous due to snow and ice is as follows:

- We **will** ensure that areas are well-lit during times of poor visibility when the sites are open, so that obstructions and potential hazards can be seen.
- We will inspect hard surface car parks and access ways to buildings daily during severe weather conditions. We will endeavour to clear snow and ice and spread salt/grit on the cleared area to provide a designated pathway to buildings. We may take other action deemed appropriate and this may be displaying suitable notices closing car parks or other measures that may be considered practicable.
  - We will not grit/salt the remainder of the parking areas or non-essential access routes.
  - We will keep a log of inspections carried out and any action taken.

#### PROVISION OF GRIT BINS

The Parish Council as is custom and practice during winter months, receives many requests for grit bins. Grit bins are purchased by the Parish Council and are then 'gifted' to County Highways who accept the responsibility for filling and refilling. Maintenance of the bin remains with the parish; however, approval from Norfolk County Council Highways has to be gained before the siting of any grit bin on the highway. There have been occasions when approval to fund a grit bin has been obtained, only to find the agreement from highways cannot be secured. The Parish Council will not therefore fund or purchase any grit bin until highways approval is secured.

Highways have criteria when considering the siting of grit bins as follows:

- Would it mainly be for road or footway use?

- Use on a footway is only agreed in exceptional circumstances:
- e.g. outside a shopping centre or entrance to school on a
- sloping gradient or on an incline
- Proximity of gradients
- Proximity to bends in road
- Proximity to footbridges
- Proximity to existing bins
- Number of premises served
- Community facilities within 200m of site
- Winter priority routes within vicinity of site.

Not all the above criteria needs to be met, however some of the above points would work against the siting of a bin (e.g. if a Priority 1 or 2 gritting route goes along the road)

The Parish Council policy in respect of addressing requests is as follows:

- Any request for a grit bin is first presented to Highways to ascertain if approval would be granted.
- A negative response would be relayed to the requester and subsequently would be made known to the
- Parish Council. The Parish Council would have the opportunity to challenge the Highways decision.

- A positive response would be relayed to the requester, with the request presented to the Parish Council for consideration of purchase.



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#### OPENING OF CARROWBECK HOUSE

ecently as Chairman of Broadland District Council (BDC), I had the privilege of opening the new Broadland Council Training Services (BCTS) training centre for young people at Carrowbeck House, Hellesdon.

As Carrowbreck is in Hellesdon, the Clerk to the Council, Patricia Kirby, also attended as did the District Councillor for Hellesdon North-West, Cllr Shelagh Gurney.

Broadland District Council now has a training establishment that we are proud of and most importantly a set up that will increase opportunities for young people by helping them to achieve their potential.

Carrowbreck is a brand new facility providing training facilities for young people. Going towards Drayton it is located on the Drayton High Road on the left hand side about 200 yards from the traffic lights.

Carrowbreck House itself has been there for some considerable time and in 2008 Broadland District Council leased it and ran it as a construction training facility for young, long term unemployed trainees and ex-offenders. This offered young people the unique opportunity to learn new skills which hopefully would benefit them in obtaining a career in construction.

Initially Broadland District Gouncil received Government funding for the project but when this was withdrawn in 2012, Broadland District Council decided to buy Carrowbreck and completely renovate it to a cost of £500,000.

What started out as a somewhat dilapidated building has now been transformed into an impressive training facility for 16 to 18 year olds to come and learn.

The building looks absolutely fantastic. Hamish Melville, the Head of Economic Development at Broadland District Council and his team gave guided tours to all the guests. It's light and airy and has succeeded in providing eco materials while retaining the look and feel of the old building. It allows young people to learn in a relaxed environment. The aim is to provide lots of young people across Norfolk with the training necessary to give them every opportunity of having a successful career from the training they receive. The fact it's located in Hellesdon is a marvellous advert for our Parish.

### A BURNING ISSUE! - A GUIDE TO BONFIRES

Under the Environmental Protection Act 1990, it is an offence to cause a statutory nuisance. This includes smoke, fumes or gases "emitted from premises so as to be prejudicial to health or a nuisance". This can include nuisance created by bonfires.

#### What constitutes a nuisance?

To be considered a nuisance a bonfire would have to be a regular problem and interfering substantially with your well-being, comfort or enjoyment of your property. Therefore if the fire is only occasionally it is unlikely to be considered a nuisance. Similarly if you are troubled by a series of bonfires from various sources this will not be considered a nuisance because no single individual could be held responsible.

If a neighbour is causing a nuisance then it is advisable to approach the person to try to resolve the matter as they may not be aware they are causing a problem and they may be more considerate in the future. However, if this approach fails the local council's environmental health department should take reasonable steps to investigate a complaint. They have power to take action under the Environmental Protection Act and can issue an abatement notice. The Environmental Protection Act does also allow private action to be taken in the magistrates court.

#### What are the penalties?

Under the Highways (Amendment) Act 1986 anyone lighting a fire and allowing smoke to drift across the road faces a fine of £2000 if it endangers traffic. In rare instances there may be local bye-laws which restrict the times bonfires are allowed.

The following guidelines have been produced by the National Society of Allotment & Leisure Gardeners

#### Good Bonfire Guidelines

Let neighbours know when and where a bonfire is to be lit.

Avoid lighting in unsuitable weather conditions e.g. windy days or damp, still days when smoke will hang in the air.

Check the air quality and avoid burning when it is "poor" or "very poor". Only burn dry material.

Never burn household rubbish, rubber or anything containing plastic, foam or paint.

Never use old engine oil, metholated spirits or petrol to light or encourage a fire.

Avoid burning at weekends or on bank holidays when people are more likely to be in their garden.

Never leave the fire unattended or leave it to smoulder – douse it with water if necessary.

Remember to check for hibernating hedgehogs and sleeping pets!

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
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#### "OVER 100 YEARS OLD AND STILL MAKING A JOYFUL NOISE!"

n Tuesday 21<sup>st</sup> October 2014 the rafters of St Mary's Church, Low Road rattled in their fixings as the children of Kinsale Infant School explored the power of the pipe organ during a morning's visit to the ancient church. But their enjoyment and surprise was only

made possible because of the generosity of individuals and organisations, including the Parish Council, who had provided grants and donations for the refurbishment of the elderly organ during the summer.

Originally built in the mid nineteenth century, the pipe organ was given to St Mary's Church by the Bush family in 1949 and has been part of Sunday service, Easter morning, Remembrance Sunday and Christmas carols by candlelight ever since, not to mention all the weddings and Baptisms. "Using the organ at least weekly helps keep it in good condition" said Church Warden Ginny Smith, "But at well over 100 years old, occasional tender loving care is essential." The works were carried out by local pipe organ specialists Boggis and Sons during which time the whole of the north aisle pews were submerged in pipes and tarpaulins. "We were amazed that it all fitted back in." laughed Ginny.

Bobby Smith chaired the Parochial Church Council grant finding team. "People have been so generous and supportive as have organisations including The Geoffrey Watling Trust, The Pennycress

Trust, The Allchurches Trust and Hellesdon Parish Council." He said "And of course the Friends of St Mary's Church were able to make an important contribution from the proceeds of their regular fundraising events"

The completion of works was celebrated with a special service on August 17<sup>th</sup> attended by Cllr Shelagh Gurney who was Chairman of the Parish Council at the time the grant was agreed and the Clerk to the Council as well as many parishioners. Organist Tim Patient said "The work on the organ has been a huge success and has ensured that it will be able to accompany services and enhance worship for many more years."

St Mary's pipe organ will be playing a key and melodious role in our services this Christmas. Everyone is most welcome.

Residents may have experienced some difficulty recently in trying to contact the Parish Council Office by telephone.


Unfortunately the office is suffering from intermittent faults which gives callers an engaged/ busy tone.

Overview from Broadland and North Norfolk Superintendent Stuart Gunn

We continue to see outboards being stolen from small boats in remote locations. To help prevent this, boat owners should ideally remove the engine completely. However, those who prefer to keep the engine on should remove the cover (cowling) and secure the engine with a cover. Norfolk Constabulary sells branded engine covers, which have been successful in deterring would-be thieves. Other tips include recording the serial number and keeping this in a safe place and marking property with a UV pen.

There have also been a number of bike thefts in the area, many of which have been stolen from gardens after being left unattended. We accept bikes will be left unattended momentarily from time to time, but please remember valuable looking bikes will attract unwanted attention of opportunist thieves. You can contact your local safer neighbourhood team to arrange getting your bike security marked. I would urge van owners to make sure they are taking the necessary security measures following a number of recent break-ins. My advice is to make sure your van is locked and secure and that expensive items such as power tools are ideally removed overnight;



#### Annual Report 2013-14 Precepts, grants, income and expenditure-council finances explained Where the money comes from and where it goes, are set out in these two diagrams



All councils need to produce an annual revenue budget which sets out the financial requirements for the forthcoming year. This becomes the basis upon which spending policy is approved and how the amount of cash required in order to finance the spending plan is calculated.

The total expenditure shown above include payments for the build of the new office for which a loan was taken out in 2012. It also includes for the refurbishment of the skate park and the outside toilets. This expenditure is to be reimbursed by Broadland District Council having been made available and possible by money from S106 agreements

The above charts show where the money has come from and how it was spent for the financial year ended March 2014.

As is evident from the diagrams employment of staff impacts extremely high on council expenditure, with the high proportion needed for salaries and associated costs for our caretakers. The caretakers and are employed by the Parish Council to serve in the Community Centre which is managed by a group of volunteers known as Hellesdon Community Centre Board of Trustees and is registered as a charity.

The accounts for the financial year 2013/14 have now been approved by the appointed Auditors and a copy of the documentation can be viewed on our website under the heading of Council – sub section Annual Return.
